# Irish Heritage Music Bursaries 2024/25

Irish Heritage is a registered charity, established in London in 1974, whose objective is to advance public education and appreciation of the arts, particularly those of Irish and Anglo-Irish music, arts, literature and drama of all genres and traditions to the benefit of the community.

It is the only Irish performing arts organisation in Britain dedicated to helping young Irish musicians and composers in the early part of their careers. It awards four valuable Bursaries annually; one for performance, one for composition, one for strings, another for vocal studies and a special accompanist's award.

Irish Heritage presents a programme of public events in established music venues and supports other organisations, including the Blackwater Valley Opera Festival that shares its aims in music and the arts. It has links with Conservatoires in Ireland and Britain to identify emerging, talented young performers and composers.

The charity's values: *Creativity, Encouragement, Collaboration, Enjoyment and Inclusivity,* reflect the legacy inherited from its founders Ethna and Charles Kennedy and are the inspiration for the organisation's Outreach and Community programme, delivered in association with the Irish Cultural Centre and London Irish Centre, which brings the joy of live music to people who cannot normally access it, to children in education and to those who benefit from music as therapy.

## **Bursaries 2024/25**

Irish Heritage is alert to the need to encourage young Irish performers and composers not only with performance opportunities but also with financial support as they transition from college to professional life. The charity's bursary programme is a key element in the provision of its support.

Thanks to the success of the organisation's fund-raising and to the support of generous donors and organisations such as the Ireland Funds, Irish Heritage is able to offer four valuable bursaries and a special accompanist's award for 2024/25.

### The Music Bursary for Performance

The Music Bursary for Performance was first awarded in 2015 and already has a distinguished list of recipients. The bursary, worth £5,000, is awarded to a student who is Irish born or of Irish parentage continuing their music education in Britain. Students studying at the UK's leading music conservatoires and colleges are welcome to apply. The successful recipient also receives a London debut at an Irish Heritage event.

#### The Brackaville Bursary for Vocal Studies

The Brackaville Bursary for Vocal Studies which was launched in 2019, is open to students who are Irish born or of Irish parentage continuing their music education in Britain. It is awarded to the singer who performs best in the auditions. In addition to a cash award of £2,500, the recipient will receive a performance opportunity at an Irish Heritage event in London.

### The Homan Potterton Bursary for String Instruments

This bursary was presented in summer 2021 by Alex Heusen in memory of Homan Potterton, a former Director of the National Gallery of Ireland and supporter of Irish Heritage. The bursary is open to students who are Irish born or of Irish parentage continuing their music education in Britain.

The bursary is awarded to the string player who performs best at the adjudication day in the Wigmore Hall in February. The recipient receives a cash prize of £3,000 and a performance opportunity at an Irish Heritage event in London.

### The Accompanist's Award

A special Accompanist's Award associated with the Blackwater Valley Opera Festival valued at £500 will be presented to the accompanist selected by the audition panel from those who have been shortlisted to audition at Wigmore Hall in February. The recipient must be a student who is Irish born or of Irish parentage continuing their music education in Britain

# The Music Bursary for Composition

The Music Bursary for Composition, which was introduced in 2018, is open to composers who are Irish born or of Irish parentage studying at recognised music conservatoires and other colleges in Ireland and Britain. The recipient of the successful composition receives an award of £3,000 to be used in furthering their artistic and professional development with their new composition receiving its world premiere at an Irish Heritage event in London.

A separate invitation and nomination form for this bursary will be issued in the new year.

# **Application Process for 2024/25**

Applications will be submitted directly to Irish Heritage and reviewed by an external panel. Documents will be circulated to all UK conservatoires as in previous years, with 6 -8 candidates invited to present a 20 minute recital at Wigmore Hall in February 2024.

(Accompanists wishing to be considered for the Accompanist Award should complete the nomination form and state their intention clearly where shown on the form. It is not possible for a pianist to compete for both the Irish Heritage Music Bursary and the Accompanist Prize.)

#### **Applications should include:**

- A supporting reference from the candidate's current tutor with information of major prizes, high profile performances, etc.
- Information on current funding/scholarships and related information
- Information about any financial hardship
- A personal statement from the performer

Please note that once submitted, candidates' programmes cannot be altered.

An application form accompanies this introduction and briefing document.

#### Eligibility

The Bursaries are open to students (instrumental or vocal) who are Irish born or of Irish parentage continuing their music education in Britain at the following colleges in the 2024/25 academic year:

- Royal College of Music
- Royal Academy of Music
- Guildhall School of Music & Drama
- Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance
- Royal Northern College of Music
- Royal Conservatoire of Scotland
- Royal Birmingham Conservatoire
- Royal Welsh College of Music & Drama
- Leeds Conservatoire

Candidates must demonstrate the highest level of performance and potential for a professional career. The recipients of the Bursaries will be expected to act as an ambassador both for Irish Heritage and the bursary programme.

#### **Age Limit**

There is no age limit for bursaries, the nominee must be studying at one of the listed conservatoires

## **Audition Process (preliminary round)**

- Candidates must submit a video of them performing 2 contrasting works via YouTube/Vimeo Link, each piece no longer than 5 minutes in duration. If a longer clip is submitted, please specify the section you would like the panel to hear.
- You will also be required to submit a proposed 20 minute Audition Programme for the final round. This programme must include a composition by an Irish composer.
- Final round auditions will take place on the **19th of February 2025** at Wigmore Hall and recipients will be announced via the Irish Heritage website and individual emails.

### **Audition Panel**

As in previous years a distinguished panel drawn from current, experienced, professional musicians will adjudicate the bursaries.
